Dear Parents and Caregivers,

This past fortnight has been a complex one for the St Benedict' community following the announcement of school closure at the end of this academic year. St Benedict's has been an extraordinary place of learning for young people in the parish for over 75 years. In that time there have been many thousands of children and hundreds of families who have been part of the school community. In addition, many staff, both past and present, have been part of the wonderful community of people who have supported children through their primary education experience.

In speaking with some of you over that past fortnight I have heard your sadness and disappointment about what will happen at the end of this year mixed in with your gratitude and acknowledgement of the creative learning experiences the staff at St Benedict's have provided for you and your child during this time of remote learning. We will continue with the learning till the end of the year in a 'business as usual' mode. This will mean teachers will provide authentic and challenging learning opportunities each day. When we return to on-site learning, we are planning exciting and inspiring experiences for the children. Teaching and learning, assessment, reports and folios will continue to be the experience at St Benedict's till December.

With the support of CEM we are beginning the process of ensuring there will be appropriate celebrations to mark the end of this experience at St Benedict's for existing students. We also have the responsibility of ensuring that every child has a place to continue their education for 2021. And another committee to look at staff placements for 2021; and winding up the school finances.

#### School transition 2021 support

As each of you make your decision about the next step in your child's journey in education there are many things in place to support you and your child as they transition. If you need to <u>photocopy documents</u> to submit with applications, then please feel free to make use of the school photocopier (with the temporary closure of Officeworks I know this is a concern). This can be done on any day. I have begun the process of phone <u>calls to surrounding Catholic school principals</u> and they have been extraordinarily positive and supportive and look forward to your applications – please make sure you let them know your child is a St Benedict's student. There will be <u>opportunities for your child to connect with their new school community</u> during Term 4 – either on-site or remotely.

#### **Social Justice Sunday**

This year's theme for Social Justice Sunday *To Live Life to The Full: Mental Health in Australia Today*. Each year the bishops of Australia sponsor the publication of a statement that touches on an issue in Australian society. I am sure they began the process of discerning the theme and the content of this statement well before the events of 2020 have unfolded. And with bushfires and then the pandemic this statement has greater relevance than ever before. An excerpt from the foreword from Archbishop of Brisbane, Mark Coleridge:

We want to say clearly that mental ill-health is not a moral failure, the result of a lack of faith, or of weak will. Jesus himself was labelled mad (Mark 3:21; John 10:19) and, like us, he suffered psychological distress (Luke 22:44; Matt 26:37; Mark 14:33; John 12:27). People experiencing mental ill-health are not some 'other' people, they are 'us'. People in our families, faith communities, workplaces and society are suffering mental ill-health – and they can be of any age or socioeconomic background. Whoever and whatever they are, they need our understanding and support...

...It is surely time for us to make mental health a real priority, so that all people may know the fullness of life which Jesus offers (John 10:10). (p.2)

This statement has much to remind us about care for each other and well-being strategies we can implement. We are reminded that at any time we can be more fragile and in need of support. And care for the whole person in the community is one of the actions we know Jesus engaged in during his ministry, for example when he cured the Gerasene demoniac (Mt8:28-34). More recently you may have seen messages of support for Melburnians on the TV from people across Australia. This simple gesture reminds us that we are in the thoughts and prayers of our whole country while we endure this difficult time of Stage 4 restrictions.

Together, we promote the fullness of life for all when we ensure appropriate care for everyone experiencing mental ill-health:

- when we reject stigmatisation,
- when we work for the transformation of social determinants of mental ill-health,
- when we call for policies and service provision that meet the needs of the poorest, most marginalised and recognise in them the face of Christ Jesus. (p.18)

#### **On-Line Safety - Interactive Learning Modules**

The Victorian Department of Education has developed some modules specifically for parents about:

<u>Bullying and cyberbullying</u>

This module - developed in partnership with Andrew Fuller (clinical psychologist and student wellbeing specialist) - has been developed to help parents understand, recognise and manage bullying and cyberbullying behaviours.

<u>Cybersafety and social media</u>

This module - developed in partnership with Susan McLean (cybersafety expert) - has been developed to help parents address standards of behaviour in the context of cybersafety and social media. The modules can also be found here.

## Prayer

Our prayer this week focuses on St Bernard, it is his feast day today, 20 August. St Bernard was a theologian and a Doctor of the church in the twelfth century, and is the patron saint of bees, beekeepers and candle-makers. He was an eloguent and charismatic young man when he first joined the Benedictine monastery of Citeaux in 1113. Later he was commissioned to found the Cistercian monastery at Clairvaux in France, where his focus on routine and austerity contributed to the growth of monasteries throughout Europe. St Bernard contributed to church thinking through his commentaries on the Bible and his many sermons, as well as his theology of sacred space and music. He was a prolific writer who constantly emphasised the love of God. He recognised the importance of lectio divina, a contemplation that include scriptural reading, meditation and prayer intended to promote the place of God in the life of the world.





St Bernard had a special devotion to Mary, the mother of Jesus, and this prayer of intercession is attributed to him:

Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known that anyone who fled to your protection, implored your help, and sought your intercession, was left unaided.

Inspired with this confidence, I fly unto you, O Virgin of virgins, my Mother, to you do I come, before you I stand sinful and sorrowful.

O Mother of the Word Incarnate! despise not my petitions, but, in your mercy, hear and answer me.

Amen.

#### **Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

**Gospel:** Matthew 15:21-28 A Canaanite woman asks Jesus to heal her daughter.

#### **Gospel Reflection**

This week's gospel provides a fascinating illustration of Jesus' response to those in need. Jesus has travelled to the area of Tyre and Sidon – part of modern day Lebanon. He was physically removing himself from the place of his very active ministry and taking a break. When the Canaanite woman approaches Jesus and his disciples, she is an interruption; a nuisance. Jesus is very abrupt with her. He tells her simply that his ministry is to the house of Israel – the Jews – and is not for her. But the woman is persistent and again asks Jesus to help her. Jesus is even more abrupt and tells her



that it is not right to take the food of the children and throw it to the dogs. Through this use of metaphor, Jesus refers to the children of Israel (the Jews) and to the gentiles and pagans – sometimes referred to as 'dogs' to reflect their lowly status in the eyes of the Jewish tradition. Still the woman persists and turns Jesus' metaphor back on him, saying that even the dogs get to eat the scraps that fall from the table.

The woman's persistence and faith pay off. Jesus is moved by her faith and through that faith heals the woman's daughter. Despite his initial abruptness and reluctance, Jesus responds with compassion to the woman's request. It is as though she needed to demonstrate that she was really serious and that she did in fact believe that Jesus could make a difference in her life and the life of her daughter. This is an important story in Matthew's gospel. This gospel was written predominantly for Jewish Christians but this story reveals that the ministry of Jesus and the reign of God is open to anyone who believes.

#### **Scriptural Context**

This passage sits in the middle of a group of three stories that make up Chapter 15 of Matthew's Gospel. The first story deals with Jesus challenging traditional views of cleanliness and uncleanliness – one of the great separators between Jews and Gentiles. The story of this week's gospel follows with its account of the Canaanite woman's great faith being recognised. Finally, Matthew's gospel relates the story of the feeding of the four thousand – a dramatic sign by Jesus of the open invitation to receive his message and ministry. The three stories, taken together, form a powerful chapter that makes clear that the message of Jesus is not exclusively for the Jews.



#### Historical Context ... Who were the Canaanites?

When Moses led the Israelites out of Egypt, the 'Promised Land' they sought was the land of Canaan (approximately the area of modern Israel, TransJordan, Syria and Lebanon). Here they were commanded to utterly destroy the Canaanites and to subdue the land. (Exodus 23:23-24) The Israelites never successfully removed all the Canaanites from the Palestine region. By the time of Jesus, the Israelites had established themselves in the region between Judea in the south and Galilee in the north, while the original inhabitants of the area had been 'squeezed out' – predominantly to the north. The Canaanites were dispossessed of their land by the Israelites and it is easy to see why there was tension between them.

#### **Senior B News**

Comprehension strategies are the focus of our Reading, particularly inference and summarising. This will be part of our poetry unit as well as other reading activities.

It was great to have everyone in 'party mode' for Reema's birthday last Friday. She got a lovely surprise (Nadine had kept the secret very well). It is wonderful that we can still celebrate these important occasions, even if it is remotely.





I'm hoping to have a BIG focus on games next week. There will be a few more bits and pieces coming home in this week's pack for some more games for both literacy and maths and maybe some other surprises. Each student has an A5 sized wallet to store all the game pieces in so please help them to keep this well organised.



## **Middle School News**

Can you believe that we are already half way through Term Three? The students have continued with their learning without missing a 'beat'. Not one student has missed the morning meeting this term and it is lovely to see their faces each day. We have introduced a new tool this term for online discussions - padlet - and are having fun connecting with each other.

In Social and Emotional Learning, we have been discussing 'Grit.' Having Grit means you have a determined courageous attitude. It means that you will keep trying to reach a goal no matter how many obstacles you face. It also means you will never give up. We added some fantastic insights:



In Mathematics, we have been exploring 3D objects and angles. We are beginning a unit on Multiplication and about to have some fun fine-tuning our Location skills.


In English our focus has been figurative writing - especially similes and metaphors. We have begun 'Book Club' and our first book is *Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes* written by Eleanor Crane. We read the book together, at a Google Meeting, and then discussed elements together. As part of our Procedural Writing unit we learnt how to make origami paper cranes. We did this at our meeting with our Xavier Year 12 friends and followed verbal instructions to make a paper crane.

We are beginning a Poetry unit where we hope to find out about poetic styles especially some Japanese styles.

In Digital Technologies we are looking at algorithms, as well as contributing to the whole school STEM challenge each fortnight. Our Art is closely linked with our Inquiry unit on Culture, as we look at how visual art is influenced by culture, particularly Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures.

We are completing our Reconciliation preparation and brainstormed online our thoughts about 'Forgiveness and Healing.'





The weekly Google Meeting with some of the Year 12 Xavier students was a highlight for our students, but was cut short due to the Xavier boys returning to remote learning.


### **Junior School News**

Feel free to ask the children to show you what they have done, especially the Middles and Seniors. If it makes sense to you, then they are probably on the right track.


